ONGOING REFORMS OF THE SOCIAL PROTECTION SYSTEM

Indonesia has undertaken significant reforms of its social protection system since the 1998 Asian financial crisis and its impact on Indonesian society. In 2012, the International Labour Organization (ILO) facilitated an Assessmentbased National Dialogue (ABND) to assess the social protection situation in the country, identify gaps and challenges, and identify recommendations to set up a social protection floor (SPF) in Indonesia. The ABND was done in close collaboration with the government, the UN SPF sub-working group in Indonesia, social partners and relevant stakeholders,

This ABND reached a consensus on social protection policy recommendations to develop a comprehensive and inclusive SPF in the country. It also made a preliminary estimate of the affordability of the proposed SPF.

In January 2014, the Government launched a national social health insurance scheme, building on existing scattered programmes, to provide universal social protection coverage for its 271 million population by 2019. The new scheme combines contributory and non-contributory components (with government subsidies for the poor).

In addition, the Government consolidated the fragmented social security programmes into one programme providing work injury benefits; old-age, disability and survivor pensions (with defined benefit and provident fund pillars); and death allowances. Workers of the informal economy can contribute on a voluntary basis to receive work injury benefits and death allowances, as well as pensions from the provident fund. Further, the Ministry of Civil Affairs implements various social assistance programmes for the poor and vulnerable.



STRENGTHENING SOCIAL SECURITY INSTITUTIONS AND EXTENDING COVERAGE

In August 2016, Indonesia conducted a High-level tripartite dialogue on employment, industrial relations and social protection. The dialogue, with other resolutions, reiterated Indonesia's commitment to extend social protection to all. The main agreed areas of action include:

- strengthening social security institutions
- achieving social security coverage for all workers, including workers of the informal economy and migrant workers
- assessing the conditions for introducing an unemployment insurance
- reviewing pension policies and regulations

A Japan-funded ILO project (2016-19) partially covers technical assistance and capacity building to extend social security coverage.

In the recently issued National Medium-Term Development Plan RPJMN 2015-19, the Government aims for universal coverage of the National Health Insurance scheme (BPJS Kesehatan) by 2019.

The objective of the social security scheme (BPJS Ketenagakerjaan) is to cover 3.5 million informal sector workers (from a baseline of 1.3 million members in October 2014) and 62.4 million formal sector workers (from a baseline of 29.5 million members in 2014) by 2019.

Our goal is to cover all workers, including vulnerable working groups. This is an important element of our 'no-poverty strategy'.
